History of the Death Penalty

Georgia's capital punishment for death penalty was around since colonial times. First ever known execution was in 1735, it was by hanging. Back then any crimes including, murder, robbery, rape, horsestealing and aiding a runaway slave was punishable to death. Up until 1920s all the execution was done by hanging and in 1924, electric was used to carry out the death penalty. Before 1976, Georgia had fourth highest rate of execution in any state, where Georgia carried out 950 executions. In 2001. The Georgia Supreme Court declared that the electric chair was cruel and is an unusual punishment so it was converted to lethal injection.

On August 11, 1967, William Furman broke into William Micke's house, murdered him and fled the scene. Later he was arrested and was sentenced to death on september 26,1968. After one day trial. The sentence was overturned by the Supreme Court on the basis of the Eighth and Fourteenth Amendments.


Current number of execution and other information
